

Minimal Two-Light Editorial Portrait

Lighting Goal

This setup proves that you don't need multiple lights to create a dramatic editorial portrait. Using just one large key light and one colored background light, you can achieve strong subject separation, soft skin tones, and a cinematic color contrast.



Light 1: Large Octa with Grid (Key Light)

- Modifier: Large Octa Softbox with Grid
- Position: Camera Left
- Purpose:
 - Primary light on the subject.
 - Produces soft, flattering light with gradual shadow transitions.
 - The grid controls spill, keeping the background dark while directing light only onto the model.
 - Creates beautiful facial shaping and subtle contrast.



Light 2: Background Light with Blue Gel

- Modifier: Standard Reflector
- Position: Camera Right, aimed at the backdrop
- Color: Blue Gel
- Purpose:
 - Adds a rich blue wash to the black background.
 - Creates separation between the subject and backdrop.
 - Introduces color contrast that complements the warm skin tones and vibrant red styling.



Camera Settings

- Camera: Canon R6 Mark II
- Lens: Canon RF 24-105mm f/4
- Shutter Speed: 1/160 sec
- Aperture: f/9
- ISO: 200 (or adjust according to the power of your lights)

Lens: 24-105mm f/4
Shutter: 1/160
Aperture: f/9

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Why This Setup Works

The large gridded octa delivers soft, directional light that wraps beautifully around the face while maintaining depth. Because the grid prevents unnecessary spill, the background stays clean and controlled. A single blue-gelled light aimed only at the backdrop transforms an ordinary black background into a cinematic scene with depth and mood.

The contrast between the warm skin tones, vivid red threads, and cool blue background creates a striking color palette without adding unnecessary complexity. It's a simple two-light setup that feels far more sophisticated than it actually is.
